#### Tempers fray in Jesmond as the rift between students and local residents hits breaking point - just who is to blame?

**AS TENSIONS in Jesmond** reach crisis point, The Courier investigates the real issues behind the stormy arguments between residents and students.

With incidents of vandalism, theft and rowdy behaviour students are rapidly becoming the target of resident's frustration and anger.

Alison Clemett, Assistant Accommodation Officer said: "Students have been jumping on cars, breaking windows, scratching cars and stealing things from gardens.'

#### Students affected

But it's not just permanent residents who are affected by this anti-social behaviour. Stuart Hatton, 3rd year computing science told The Courier: "The other night at about 3am, I heard six or seven guys singing and shouting in the street. I was just about to tell them to shut up when a woman went out and told them to 'shut the fuck up'.

"They were quiet for about a minute and then they came back out of their house and started smashing bottles and breaking

The danger now is that all students will be tarred with the brush. encouraging same unjustified accusations of noise and unacceptable behaviour.

One student has spoken out over exactly this problem.

Geraldine Englard, 3rd year English student talked to The Courier about what she feels is unfair victimisation from her neighbours.

noisy. In fact, we're hardly ever in. Since we moved in this year, we've had one or two complaints a week. Our neighbours have complained to the landlord, the police and the council"

Geraldine defended herself: "We had one party - a housewarming. We told all the residents and everyone was fine with it. One or two of our neighbours even came to

#### Accusations

The housemates feel angry about what they describe as their neighbours 'petty accusations'. Particularly, they explained, as the landlord had taken measures to have the floor soundproofed.

They have come to the door and

demanded that we listen to our music on headphones, as well as complaining about my flatmates bangles jangling when she takes a shower in the morning.'

The situation came to a head when they received a letter from the Environmental Health Department complaining about

She explained: "I know about 3 of 4 other houses who have had letters from the council. Apparently if this carries on, not "There's four of us and we're not only could we be evicted we could lose our honours."

#### **Badly behaved**

It appears to be a case of the minority spoiling it for the masses. One resident, Mrs B Robinson explained: "I'm not against students. I have one in my family. But some of them living in Jesmond are badly-behaved young people who have left home and feel they can do what they can do what they want, when they want"

Some students agree. Peter Taylor, 3rd year politics student said: " I think that sometimes students forget they don't live in halls anymore and residents live in Jesmond too".

## SEA CLUB BOSS DENIES HOMOPHOBIA CLAIMS

**NEW QUAYSIDE club Sea has** denied being homophobic after two male students claimed they were thrown out of the club for KISSING.

Andre Cooke, a third year Genetics student at Newcastle Uni alleged he was forcibly removed with no explanation after being followed by one of the bouncers

Andre told The Courier: "I met a guy I know. We went to talk on the stairs, one thing led to another, and we ended up kissing."

He went on to describe how the bouncer followed them into the toilet and stood watching them while they used the facilities

Andre and the other student, a second year who asked not to be named, were later approached by the same bouncer who demanded to see their tickets.

We explained that they were in our jackets, which we didn't have with us," Andre said.

"Instead of letting us get our jackets and wallets, he marched us to the door and literally threw us out, then slammed the door in our faces."

He added "He gave us no warning and

no explanation. I was really pissed off. It was the first time I had been to Sea and it will be the last. I've kissed blokes in Ikon and Chase before and nobody has batted an eyelid."

Outraged LGB officers Lisa Harvey-Smith and Geoff Frost slammed the club, saying: "This is the year 2000 and we're supposed to be a civilised nation. Why the hell can't two consenting adults have a bit of a snog on a night out?"

'We'll be writing to the management of Sea, and if we're not satisfied with their response, we'll be organising a mass boycott. Watch this space.'

Cooke went on to say "He shouldn't have had a problem with us kissing at all, but if he'd said "People are uncomfortable with what you're doing, can you please stop", I would have accepted it.'

We weren't doing it to piss people off. It's an absolute joke to throw us out with no explanation," he blasted.

Bob Senior, the managing director of Ultimate Leisure, the company who owns Sea, was adamant that the club had no homophobic policies.

The Architect who designed Sea is gay and we're happy that he is. I don't know about the incident and neither does the manager of Sea," claimed Senior.

This incident comes only weeks after Sea made the news for denying admission to two people because they were bald.

Another Jesmond resident, Brigid McCarney complained: "I have suffered shouted abuse from the street after politely requesting that music be turned down."

Ian Kitchen, Communications Officer said: "The new developments on Osborne Road haven't helped - it's turned Jesmond into a new Bigg Market. And unfortunately it's always the students that will be blamed. It's sad that the bad things are always highlighted because most students are capable of both enjoying themselves and getting on with their neighbours"

Geraldine contacted the Accommodation Office and said she found them "extremely

helpful".

Alison Clemett talked about their attempt to tackle the problem: "It's almost bigbrotherish to say don't do this or don't do that but there are real issues of criminal damage and intimidation. We don't want residents to pre-judge students. A small minority are the problem

when they get drunk". We're holding fortnightly surgeries in Jesmond Library, residents, students and landlords are all welcome - we try and resolve the conflicts. We've held two so far, but no students have come. I think the scheme will work, we've had some really positive feedback"

Derek Nicholson, University bigwig wanted to make the point:

"This is not a student-bashing exercise on the part of the University, but we are determined to work closely with students. residents and agencies to tackle

Student's terror as drink's spiked with possible date-rape drug

**NEWCASTLE** students are again being warned of the dangers of spiked drinks after a fresher was drugged in a Quayside nightclub.

The victim, who does not wish to be named, was in the club on a Wednesday night earlier this month.

The female student, who was "not particularly drunk' was upstairs in the club when she began to feel ill some time after 12.30am.

'I don't remember having a drink, let alone who gave it to me," the terrified fresher

Her symptoms included

deteriorating eyesight and violent spasms. Her eyes rolled back in her head and she was unable to hold her head straight.

"I couldn't feel my body," said the victim.

"The music seemed to be slowing down. None of my senses were working properly. I could have walked into a wall and not noticed.

"Half of my brain was OK, but the other half just couldn't react. I thought, my God, I'm going to pass out and that's it.

The student was able to reach the ladies toilets, where she collapsed. She told The Courier: "People were laughing because they thought I was so drunk.

Fortunately the victim

was found by a friend who recognised her symptoms and managed to help her out of the club, where bouncers advised phoning for an ambulance


She was taken to the RVI, but no blood tests were carried out to determine the nature of the drug.

She was discharged later the same night, but felt dizzy and light-headed for the next two days.

She is still unable to remember most of what happened but would like to thank the friend who found

## Rooftop antics shot down by police chopper and gun squad

TWO STUDENTS were arrested last week after a rooftop prank with a loaded air pistol.

Neil Brant, 19, an Environmental Biologist at Newcastle University and Simon Turner, 20, a student from Newcastle College were firing pellets at bottles and cans on the roof of Neil's girlfriend's Bigg Market flat on the afternoon of October 16.

They were later officially cautioned for disrupting public


Their gun was also confiscated.



## WHAT DOES IT TAKE TO **GET A TUTOR WHO CARES?**

### Tutors have got their priorities all wrong says JAKE LEE

"YOU should feel free to turn to him or her at any time for advice and help on all matters, both academic and non-academic".

Wouldn't it be nice if that was how the tutor system worked, as it's lavishly boasted about in the glossy university prospectus? Because for many, that statement can seem laughable as the tutor system increasingly fails in its objectives, being outdated and in need of urgent reform.

Cath, a 2nd Year Biology Student is still waiting for a reply from her tutor, having e-mailed him to meet more than 3 weeks ago. Similar sentiment is found with a dentist who wishes to remain anonymous who describes her tutor as 'not really caring', 'insincere' when they do finally meet, and 'not approachable'. In asking around, students from different years and different faculties all too often expressed such negative feelings. Few are happy to give their names all too fearful of rocking the boat. As one student said, 'your tutor must be kept happy at all costs'.

What to do? Sadly the university has you firmly by your balls. The complaints system is a joke, as when you finally leave university, a reference from a tutor is vital. Make complaints about your tutor and say goodbye to your reference. We're told 'In exceptional cases it may be possible for a students tutor to be changed'. What constitutes an 'exceptional' case? Anyway, it just leaves the

remaining others to be lumbered with a hopeless tutor.

In a rational and reasoned world we might expect that £1000 tuition fee to help matters. Maybe relieve the pressures of lecturers and tutors, perhaps some extra spending in priority areas? Not a chance, for matters seem only to go down hill. In line with the current trend, the government has announced there will be a further 1% cut in spending per student.


But many do not have the inclination or desire to deal with

lecturers who genuinely want to be there while it seems your department does zilch. If some departments can manage it, why can't the others?

Not all tutors are bad, in fact, many are frighteningly good. For every person who moans about the system, there's one who finds it does a lot for them. Yet it's a lottery. A lottery we never signed up for, and shouldn't have to take



So the truth emerges that tutors simply don't have the time to deal with us. If it seems that some would like nothing more than to lock themselves in a room and bury themselves in research, then it is probably because they have to. The pressures to win research grants are immense.

It's obligatory to meet your tutor each semester. For many that's a mere 10 minutes each year, 5 minutes each semester. This hardly makes them a 'source of sympathy

the undergraduates. Including myself, many students are fortunate to have experienced a far better tutor system back at school. Yes, at school we were there longer than 3 years, and had far more opportunities to get to know them. But the essential difference is that those teachers would choose to become tutors. Academics, are foremost academics, and tutoring can be a nuisance that comes with the job. This







## SHOOT ME IN THE HEART

**Gulbenkian Theatre** 

THE HIGHLY acclaimed, 'Told by an Idiot' Theatre Company returned to Newcastle last week, kicking off a nation-wide tour of their new production Shoot me in the Heart.



Hunter and Hayley Carmichael, this colourful, energetic adaptation of a South American short story is set in 1930's Argentina. Presented 'In Traverse', with the audience on opposite sides of the stage, the action unfolds on a set that is strikingly simple. This seating arrangement in fact becomes central to the play. Questions of perspective arise, as each half of the audience sees slightly different elements of the performance. Set designer Naomi Wilkinson was keen to stress the importance of simplicity in the set design: 'The audience is supposed to engage their own imagination - You have to do some of the work yourself!'

Shoot Me in the Heart introduces a widowed mother, whose teenage daughter has grown up in every way but physically. As the play progresses it becomes clear that tiny Carlotta wants more from life than her protective mother will allow. The narrative follows an unlikely romance between Carlotta and an older man, on his return to the village from his travels. This taboo love affair causes tension amongst the two-faced, narrow-minded villagers.

Feelings of both disgust and amusement come into play during the cruel but hilarious mockery of the bizarre couple. Opinions are voiced on stage by a 'chorus', using exaggerated comment, expression



This forces us to consider our own personal prejudices. As emotional and moral ambiguities continue throughout the play, it is often difficult to tell whether characters are actually laughing or crying. In spite of such difficulties, the lovers achieve happiness by learning to embrace life with all its idiosyncrasies.

The alternative, of refusing to confront prejudice and fear, is shown to bring only misery. The magical realism of a circus is used to represent the diversity of life, whilst simultaneously treading the boundaries of taste. Director Paul Hunter justifies his use of a certain amount of 'shock-factor' as part of his effort to avoid sentimentality.

The true success of *Shoot me in the Heart* is achieved by the top quality acting. Through the cast's pure energy and comical pace, a good deal of positive light is thrown onto an otherwise dark fairytale.

The play explores a localised consideration of what is 'normal', extends it to universal proportions, then questions our position to judge what normality is anyway. Thought provoking material, presented in an original and passionate way. If you get a chance to catch this production elsewhere on the tour, grab it, 'cos it's well good

"SEVENTEEN?" mutters Moz, a.k.a. Tim Barnes, as he surveys his meagre audience in disbelief.

He shakes his head. "Seventeen..." he says again with a different, more resigned intonation. "How many of you are staff?" Approximately seven people nervously raise their hands. Moz shakes his head again. The audience shuffle awkwardly, wishing they had all brought more friends.

It is the second week in the Carlsberg Ice Comedy Network tour held every other Tuesday in the Global. The headline act, Gordon Southern, is sat behind me, occasionally chuckling as his colleague does an admirable job of warming up the pitiful turnout.

He is almost unremarkable in appearance; tall(ish), young(ish), with spiky dark hair, and dressed in combats and trainers he fits right in with the rest of the audience. His large eyes are constantly moving, giving him a slightly manic look.

When he hits the stage, Southern's delivery seems as casual as his appearance. Adapting well to the challenge of performing in front of so few, the atmosphere



feels cosy and friendly. Then suddenly, almost schizophrenically, his demeanour changes and he's off, like an excitable child trying to impress his mates after two litres of Coca-Cola, and his enthusiasm is infectious.

His material is as diverse as it is bizarre, with topics ranging from kidnapping children in Ikea to the masturbation habits of the Queen. Very occasionally his jokes fall flat but his endearing charm sees him through.

Gordon Southern's real strengths lie with improvisation and interaction with the audience. He deals out witty observations and good-humoured insults at lightning speed without humiliating or patronising any of the assembled crowd.

There is no doubt that the evening would have benefited from a larger, more enthusiastic turnout. So get down to the Global on Tuesday's. If tonight's performance is anything to go by, the rest of the tour will be well worth the effort.

WHAT LIES BENEATH, starring Harrison Ford and Michelle Pfeiffer, is a scary supernatural thriller, released just in time for Halloween.

The story is based around a family so perfect that it has to suffer. The down side is that all this has been done before. In places it doesn't feel like a film in its own right so much as a homage to Hitchcock (Harrison's character is called Norman etc.) as well as other thrillers such as *Fatal Attraction*.

However the film's real weakness is the screenplay. The early stages tend to drag and rely on well-worn devices as opposed to plot and the ending comes dangerously close to being laughable.

Despite all this the film has many redeeming factors. Pfeiffer's performance is fantastic, the direction is classy and there are some truly spine chilling moments. As well as all this the film has a special practical use. Just take along flatmates who spend too long in the bathroom and after watching this film, that particular annoying habit will be well and truly cured.


In short, the clear, in-depth knowledge of the author, James

Debbie Isitt's debut feature gleefully peels away the apparently cosy veneer of cul-de-sac life to reveal the anxiety, frustration, anger and jealousy festering away underneath.

In a trademark performance, Ricky Tomlinson plays Mr Peach a failed double glazing salesman who goes head to head with his loutish new neighbour Mr Chapman, played with superb menace by Phil Daniels (of Parklife fame). Mr Chapman is scornful of Peach's attempts to draw him into the cosy community of the close and Mi Peach focuses the bitterness of his career failures and mounting debts on his new neighbours until matters escalate into a true battle

Daniels and Tomlinson in particular superbly epitomise everything that is English suburbia. The cinematography is original and Isitti's voyeuristic approach is undoubtedly an integral part of the film is success.

The action has immediacy and edge yet at times I sensed there was something disturbing and all too familiar going on in the film. This may be a low budget film but it makes you think, feel and most importantly it will make you laugh.

Final Verdict: This is a jet black comedy with razor sharp wit. It received a standing ovation at the recent Venice Film Festival where. amongst others, new films from Woody Allen and Martin Scorcese were previewed. What more need I say? 


