Soccer Club embroiled in banning dispute

AU controversy over GBH case

UNIVERSITY FOOTBALLER and postgraduate has been banned from the Union building after breaking the jaw of another player during a training session - while he was recovering from a broken neck.

But controversy surronds the one year ban that was dished out by the Union's Disciplinary Committee last week amid allegations of unofficial 'barring' of the victim from the Soccer

David Mortimer, Captain of the University 3rd XI, pleaded guilty to a charge of Grevious Bodily Harm at Newcastle Magistrates Court over the summer and was given the minimum sentence - a 6 month conditional discharge.

Explaining his actions Mortimer said that the victim Daniel Tobin had 'hacked' him from behind during a 'non-contact' training session two days before a UAU final match last term.

Speaking at the hearing he said: "I didn't mean to do it, it was purely instinctive. I fell face down on the floor, jumped up, swung round and hit him instinctively - I didn't even see who it was until I hit him.'

He believes Tobin has only brought the matter to the Union because he has been told 'not to turn up' for future football

"He has had 8 months to bring the charge and he does it now just two weeks after he was told he wasn't of a suitable standard to play for the team.

'It's a malicious attack on the football team through someone he knows he can hurt - me.'

But Tobin claims his ban has nothing to do with his ability to play, rather that it shows the Soccer Club closing ranks to protect Mortimer, who has played for them for five years.


Acting as a character witness for Mortimer at the Union hearing Alan Brown, the team's staff coach, denied the

At the hearing Brown said: "I've known David for five years. I made him Captain of the Thirds team because the Soccer Club have won the fair play award for the last three years. I decided David was the best man to keep us on track for the award this year. I have every confidence in his ability to lead by example.

The Soccer Club is an elite, that's the way we have to operate. Only those who are good enough can play. They [Tobin and his friends] were so bad they interfered with what I was trying to do. "

He maintains the only reason Tobin was asked not to attend was because 'he simply wasn't good enough'.

But Tobin claims that 'Rusty', one of the Club Captains,



repeatedly asked him when he would be fit to play and has in my mouth. When it happened I was recovering from a broken revealed that he played for England Schoolboys for several

Speaking to The Courier he said: "A guy called Tarquin pulled me over at the end of a session and said due to the friction between me and David Mortimer, and because he had been there longer than me, I wasn't welcome. That's his exact words.

The reason I involved the Union is that obviously I'm now uncomfortable around the campus and I wanted something to be done. All I'm concerned about is my well-being .

then I found out I had to have another. Daniel intends to challenge his ban from the Soccer Club at a meeting of the Athletic Union Disciplinary Committee and is clearly bitter over what has happened: "I was asked to play when I was only 70% fit so it's scandalous for them to say now that I wasn't good enough."

Meanwhile Mortimer is considering challenging his ban from

Distinctly damp demo

TUS'S NATIONAL demonstration against student hardship was a damp and dismal affair last week despite one of the highest turn-outs for many years and the largest Newcastle contingent for over a decade.

Over 20,000 students from Universities and Colleges up and down the country turned out to protest against the 30% cut in grants over the next three years, announced in the last budget.

The demonstration effectively brought London's West-End to a halt as demonstrators marched from Battersea Park to Hyde Park last Wednesday.

Despite the number protesters the event passed off

without the confrontations with Police that marred last year's demonstration called by the Student Activist Alliance (a coalition of Left wing groups) which was boycotted by NUS.

A 'sit-down' protest by students at the front of the march momentarily threatened to spark trouble but the group were quickly moved on by stewards.

But tempers did flare at the end of the demonstration during the rally in Hyde

Three comedians, booked by NUS to liven up the event, were booed from the stage while some demonstrators with megaphones shouted: "Student hardship isn't a laughing matter."

And for many of those who made the six hour coach journey from Newcastle to London the demonstration was no laughing matter either.

With buses leaving at 5:00am by the time Newcastle demonstrators reached London many were too tired to do anything but stagger round the march route dragging their banners behind them. Sarah Williams, the Union's VP Finance, hit out at the decision to hold a 'national'

demonstration in London again. "It's ridiculous" she said, "by the time the protesters get down there they are too tired to demonstrate.

"I'd like to see some demonstrations further



The current policy, to concentrate on London, is unfair on students at Northern and Scottish institutions.

"Having said that the demo was one of the most successful for many years, both

in terms of numbers and media coverage which is allowing us to get over the message to the public that students are in real financial trouble."

AHUNDRED SCHOOL kids stormed the Union building last week to join in the campaign against government education cuts.

Pupils from Blakelaw school in the West End, defied teachers by going on strike and marched into town, holding up traffic and visiting the Union before staging a demonstration at the Monument along with Newcastle students and pupils from Kenton

Aged between thirteen sixteen, the protesters assembled outside their school in the morning carrying banners and chanting anti grant cut slogans.

oppose government cuts in funding, which will force lots of the schools round here to close," claimed pupil Stacey McLaren.

Teachers tried in vain to convince them to return to lessons, but the demonstration went ahead.

Fifteen year old Sara Bryson said "Our teachers told us we couldn't do anything, but we've proved we can we've even occupied a road."

The pupils said they had attended a similar demonstration last week at the Monument, but it had not had the same impact as they were on half term.

Last week's demo certainly drew attention

 $T^{\text{WO STUDENTS}}$ fell victim to a frenzied attack by an incensed crutch-wielding granny last week, shortly before the woman hit a member of University staff.

The unfortunate couple were badly shaken by the ordeal, in which a female student was beaten around the arms and body in an unprovoked and senseless assault.

Tara Lloyd-Jones, a third year History student, was walking through the underpass from Jesmond towards the Robinson Library with Marine Biologist Fergus Allan when the old woman struck.

Accusing the pair of laughing at her, the woman, described as around 80 and just four feet ten inches tall, began to beat Tara with her walking stick, screaming "Don't snigger at me, you

The couple then ran off to the safety of the Library - but the woman followed them in through the revolving doors.

"We had just been laughing between ourselves, and the woman was walking behind us," said Tara. 'It was really embarrassing - everyone must have wondered what we had

When they realised the woman was following them, the pair ran upstairs, leaving Library staff to deal with the situation.

'She wanted to see the two students, and then demanded to talk to someone in authority," said John Moore, the porter on duty, who says the woman has been into the Library on several

Blood bank turns down gay

AMALE STUDENT at Newcastle University was told he could not give blood because he was gay.

The student said he felt humiliated by the reaction he received from the doctor and nurses when he went to donate.

"They were very friendly before I told them I was gay but they went all cold after that. I was so ashamed, I felt like crying. I only 'came out' a couple of weeks ago and I'm already feeling discriminated against."

Leaflets printed by the Blood Transfusion Service say men who have had sex with other men are not allowed to give blood. The anonymous student says he has never taken risks with his sex life: by Lucy Cypher

"My blood is as safe as the next person's" he claims. "I explained to the doctor that I'd not taken any risks and he said it made no difference. If I am gay then I can't give blood. it's as simple as that."

Doctor Chapman from the Regional Blood Transfusion Service explained the 'no gay blood' policy is based on national guidelines. "There is no negotiating around it" she said "Even if the student took no risks, we still can't accept his blood. There is no such thing as totally safe sex and the blood tests we do don't guarantee contaminated blood will be

detected. The HIV virus takes a few weeks from the date of infection

to be detectable by the tests so we cannot always be sure that the blood is safe. That is why we don't take blood from people in high risk categories, like male homosexuals, just in case.

Heterosexuals who have had unprotected sex are able to give blood. "If we asked all heterosexuals if they'd had unprotected sex we would lose all our donors and we need as much blood as we can get our hands on" she explained. 'Heterosexuals are not classed as being in a high risk category and so they are more than welcome to donate."

The show will take place on Sat.19th and Sun.20th of Nov. at 7:30pm in King's Hall, Armstrong





'Loan sharks' reeled in

attling revelations about the Student Loans Company were revealed by BBC's 'Here and Now' programme last week.

The programme revealed the way in which the company has refused to extend repayment deadlines and employed private detectives to pursue debtors while spending thousands on expense account business entertainments'.

As student demonstrators took to the streets of London, protesting against student hardship, 'Here and Now' revealed government plans to increase interest rates on student loans to match those of high street banks.

It also revealed that some 10,000 exstudents are facing legal action from the company - and 2,000 have already been pursued through the Courts, placing them on credit blacklists that will haunt them for the rest of their lives.

Stephen Byers, Labour MP for Wallsend, was quoted on the programme saying: "It is becoming very clear that the Student Loans Company is acting in a very heavy handed manner as far as former students are concerned.

Defending it's actions a spokesman for the company, which is publicly funded and privately run, claimed that it was acting in tax payers interests by trying to recover their money but he failed to explain its enormous expense

account spending.

In just fifteen weeks during 1992 the board of the company spent £375.00 on whisky and spirits as well as splashing out on pop concerts, cricket matches and cigars.

On New Year's day, 1992, the Company's chief executive Ron Harrison took family and friends out for lunch - and then changed the date on the bill to make the lavish meal look like legitimate business expenses.

Harrison received the C.B.E. last month.

The company is currently facing the possibility of an investigation by the Scottish Fraud Office.

But when they faced the threat of investigation by MPs last year the company drew up a questions and answers guide for employees.

The Department of Education convinced the Public Accounts Committee not to the company as it would be 'detrimental to the company's

Five members of the executive, who had come under fire for mismanagement of Union funds, defeated a motion of no confidence last Friday.

In the meeting angry students

 Heckled and confidenced the chairman

• Voted not to debate a no confidence motion at all, and

•Ended the meeting early by walking out early amid heated scenes in the

union building. Karen Rudd, President, said to The Courier before the meeting: "We have got tons of

evidence to prove the allegations are wrong. "We're being witch-hunted for political purposes.'

But former external affairs officer David Holden, who believes five members of the current executive have acted improperly, said: "They represent a left-wing revolutionary faction which does not follow Labour party policies.

"The president, Karen Rudd, and other members of the executive have no option but to resign.

On Thursday a motion of no confidence had been overwhelmingly carried at another Emergency General Meeting, however the executive refused to recognise the vote and claimed the meeting was unofficial.

The meeting on Friday was first declared 'un-

NORTHUMBRIA constitutional' as students on the Longhurst campus had not the Longhurst campus had not been informed.

But a vote established the meeting as constitutional and a letter from staff trade union UNISON was read out. It stated that industrial action was being considered as staff no longer felt secure in their employment.

Amendments were then tabled by Union President Karen Rudd which, if accepted, would effectively mean the debate was no longer one of no confidence.

Chairman Walter Hepbourne-Scott was then replaced in an unprecedented move after being noconfidenced by those present. He had consistently failed to control the early stages of the meeting.

Speaking for amendments Karen Rudd accused David Holden and others of "scare-mongering" and denied it was illegal to fund coaches to the Criminal Justice Bill demonstration claiming it was in all Northumbria student's interests to fight the

Those opposing amendments cited the 'ultra vires' rule and stated that by sending coaches the Union was open to prosecution. It was also alleged that lines in the current financial statement had been removed.

But after a conclusive vote the amendments were carried. The meeting was then closed after most of those present walked out.

Another motion of no confidence has been submitted to the General Secretary and will be debated next week.



Norwegians. Still, Cryer & Rushton was accessible to all, especially amongst


the mature members of the audience; just as well, their terrain tended to be nostalgic.



went out to a largely illiterate population. So we spread the word at roadshows and rallies, travelling the length and breadth of South Africa, extolling the virtues of the National Party.

There were parts of South Africa that did not seem to have been touched by civilisation and there were parts which seemed to have

been crippled by it. I saw them all, travelling in the media bus, following the presidential entourage.

We would spend three days at a time going to different ocations, usually about two or three hundred miles apart, handing out badges, flags, hats, t-shirts and leaflets all printed in the N.P.'s colours of green, blue, yellow and red. Meanwhile, F.W. would give a speech in a football stadium or a farm, packed to the hilt with black people.

This was

phenomenon we had not counted on. Although the NP never attracted the crowds the ANC could, they were reaching, intentionally, for the first time in their history, members of the black population. However things would never be easy for the NP, given their lack of credibility, and the ANC made that blatantly

obvious, as did the media.

Although I acknowledged the existence of this animosity I never understood the depth of the aggression until I came face to face with it.

Travelling through a black township in the Orange Free State, where De Klerk was scheduled to speak, we arrived to find about 500 ANC demonstrators clamouring for the "murderer F.W. to go away or be killed".

I climbed out of a car, heavily


decorated with NP paraphenalia, to be accosted by seven, large

They picked me up, threw me over the bonnet of the car, taunted me with a burning tyre, and screamed that I was a "fucking white supremacist". They would have killed me had it not been for the presence of the media. I suddenly realised that life is a precious commodity.

During my time on the campaign trail I realised that there are moments in the history of the world that can never be forgotten, and Apartheid will always be one of those moments. But it took courage and strength to overcome and April 27, 1994 marked the dawning of a new era.

I only hope it's legacy will overcome that which preceded it. There is no justice in revenge and South Africa is too magical a country to be destroyed by it.





The X-Factor

Today's students are constantly described as slackers, going nowhere fast. We've had ra-ra skirts, legwarmers and deely-boppers as our inheritance, and we'll leave flares, platforms and punks as our legacy... a generation constantly moving backwards. Jill Kidson and Sally Hall investigate the reality behind the media hype behind Generation X.

The 90's teenager is pessimistic, apathetic, and apolitical. But are such labels Media Hype or Reality? A recent spate of slack-happy films, in particular "Reality Bites", focus on the concept of today's youth as having no direction, ideologies or opinions. Ethan Hawke and Winona Ryder were the icons of the film, weed fiends pursuing the debauchery of sex, drugs and rock and roll, disillusioned with the real world after the oasis of college. All idealism is abandoned as the future becomes more hopeless.

Such a view of life is compounded by the sense that everything has been done before. Nothing seems to

change; fifteen years under the government

wearing what we wore when they got voted in. The only innovation is the

huge upsurge in stylish violence, with films like 'Pulp

Fiction' and 'True Romance' selling out - maybe in both senses of the word. In July's issue of 'The Face', six pages of fashion were devoted to a bloody couple who looked like they had been dragged through an

abbatoir backwards. The latest fashion accessory is a gallon of blood to brighten up your white-trash outfit.

So, what does the student of the 90's, in the Gazelles they wore when they were ten, have to look forward to? The MTV generation is just as bad in England as the USA, with graduate unemployment rocketing and political involvement plummeting. Are we the slacker generation?

Many students would agree that they spend more time in the bar than the library or on demos. No longer is radicalism associated with youth as it was in the 60's

Although concerned about environmental issues, sexism, racism and the cut in grants, it would appear the majority are not fired enough to take public

action. In fact 44% of 18-25 year olds did not even vote in the elections of 1992. Apathy is rife amongst most Newcastle students. Those who do





From here on out, the game was marred by fumbles and penalties for both sides, but by the end of the contest, Newcastle came away with



TEWCASTLE, 2-0 down at halftime, staged a gutsy second half comeback to end up drawing 3-3 with Sunderland. Three second half goals from the Newcastle trio of Watterson, Cass and Mulvaney seemed to have set Newcastle up for an unexpected win, but Sunderland bundled in a late equaliser.

After thirty-three minutes Newcastle were 2-0 down after Cross had been beaten for pace by Ablett, the Sunderland striker, who finished with calm assurance as he placed the ball to Duddy's left.

When the referee blew for half-time, it seemed it would only provide some respite for



Newcastle, but in fact it turned out to be the turning point of the match.

Newcastle started the second half looking to get back into the match, but Sunderland seemed to be content to sit on their two goal lead and try to hit Newcastle on the counter-attack. This decision turned out to be their downfall.

Watterson started their comeback with a goal in the sixtieth minute following some good approach play by Green. Three minutes later Cass drew the sides level with a stunning individual goal. He received the ball inside his own half, went round three Sunderland players, and finished with consummate ease.

Newcastle then took control of the game, and with only fifteen minutes left Mulvaney scored a wonderful goal from the edge of the box, as he curled it past the keeper into the top left hand corner.

However, with five minutes left, Sunderland snatched a late equaliser, following a goalmouth scramble after Duddy failed to claim a cross from the wing.




