# Crackdown on porn

TUDENTS who store and distribute pornography from the Internet on University computers could face criminal charges.

The University is clamping down on abuse of the information superhighway and a number of students have already been disciplined this term.

And, depending on the nature of the pictures, offenders may be dealt with by the police as well as the University.

Computing Service Director Paul Salotti told The Courier: "We ake this matter very seriously as any student who handles offensive material on University computers is breaking their user

The raids have occurred across Jesmond from Sandyford to Ilford Road with one thing in common: residents have returned to find their front doors bolted.

Emma Stevens, Welfare and Campaigns Officer, believes that burglars have been moving their business from the Fenham area into Jesmond owing to the more lucrative market on offer there.

#### Ransacked

On October 19, a house on Osborne Avenue was ransacked. "Thousands of pounds worth of goods were stolen", said Rory Renwick who estimated that he had about £600 of property

And the next day the house directly behind on Shortridge Terrace was raided. "They even took our washing machine", said Bobby Cameron. For Mel Butler-Adams the incident has had much greater repercussions - it has forced her to move out

Salotti confirmed that several students had already using found been pornography on University computers, but refused to reveal whether any were set to face criminal charges.

But he added: "If we found material that was clearly illegal we would consider passing the matter on to the police, though first we would discuss the matter with the student's tutor.

"We have three options: banning the user for a period of time, referring the student to the Registrar and contacting the police. Our course of action would depend on the individual case.

LOCAL lecturer was awarded £30,000 after a colleague called him an 'Irish Prat'.

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## **NUS call on Government** to ban Islamic extremists

THE National Union of Students this week put forward a motion to the Government to ban the Islamic fundamentalist group Hizb-ut-Tahrir from Britain.

The motion, backed by the Association of University Teachers wants Britain follow suit of many Middle Eastern Countries who have already banned them for their overtly homophobic, anti-

semitic slogans.

Evidence that the group has infiltrated Britain's Universities was obtained through a 24 hour phone line set up for students to report acts of racism. Over two thirds of the calls were about Hizb-ut-Tahrir, including 31 acts of physical intimidation. There have also been clashes

The group has already been banned by over a hundred student unions. NUS president Jim Murphy described them as "the single biggest extremist threat in the

U.K. at the moment."

Education secretary Gillian Shephard has promised to try and push the motion through parliament.
Hizb-ut-Tahrir themselves

deny the allegations and "challenge anyone to bring one shred of evidence that implicates its members or supporters using intimidatory behaviour on the university physical or otherwise.'

The group has been active in Newcastle's Islamic cultural awareness week,

between students and the leafleting in the marquee group at four university outside the Union. They were asked to move on by the University police as they had not gone through the official channels. The leaflets weren't overtly racial but did bear the black flag logo associated with Hizb-ut-Tahrir.

A member of the Union of Jewish Students in Newcastle said of the NUS motion; active move to avoid the distress, intimidation and harassment that follows in the wake of Hizb-ut-Tahrir must

be applauded.
"I would hate to be a victim of the hate campaigns that have been run in other campuses when Jewish students are followed and photographed..... it happened to my cousin and I was overwhelmingly sickened."

Nearly half of the female students surveyed worry "often" or "always" about debt, compared to under a third of men.

At a time when student hardship is on the way up and grants are dwindling, the average female student is beginning the academic year with debts of around £1,100, wheras the average lad's debt will be more like £1,600. In line with this trend, 54% of men took out student loans compared to 48% of women, four-fifths of bank and



# Give us a break - I - A recap of the Nestlé ban debate in 1995

Breast feeding is the normal way of feeding

In February 1990 a motion was passed by our Students' Union dictating that the sale of any Nestlé products by the Union Society be forbidden. Five and a half years on, this motion is still in existence even though very few of us around the Union today had any say in this decision. As with all Union motions, the Nestlé boycott has to be reaffirmed every three years. In February 1993 the motion was again passed, and so the boycott is up for review again this year.

Sophie Moore, who spent a year at a Nutrition Centre in Dar es Salaam, Tanzania, explains why our Student Union, along with 70 others and indeed the National Union of Students endorses the campaign against Nestlé in the U.K:

".....no artificial food can completely mimic the nutritional and protective properties of human milk......breast feeding is preferable to artificial feeding and should be encouraged." (DHSS 1980).

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infants in all traditional societies; it is safe, inexpensive and helps protect infants against disea However, despite the many advantages, breast feeding has declined in many countries for various reasons, including the obvious convenience for working mothers in settings not conducive to breast feeding. Also, many health discourage feeding promote bottle feeding through the early separation of mother and baby However, it is the inappropriate advertising and promotion of bottle feeding that is much to blame for reinforcing and escalating the misguided views listed above. And it is for this latter reason that Nestlé, the world's largest food company, who control about half the global baby food market, shot to the centre of a continuing battle concerning their role (and malpractices) in the promotion of infant formulas.

So what did Nestlé do wrong, and why have they become the centre of all the negative attention and boycotts? Baby Milk

Action, the leading campaigners in the U.K. against Nestlé, cites the giving away free or subsidised baby milks to hospitals and maternity wards. But this can be detrimental and often dangerous to the infants health. Just giving a new-born baby a bottle makes it more likely that later breast feeding attempts will fail, and the baby become dependent on the artificial milk. Leading logically on from this problem is the cost of keeping up bottle feeding once away from the freebie hospital handouts. This is by no means a cheap alternative, and often poor mothers try to over-dilute the powder so it will last longer, ending in baby-malnutrition. But worse, far worse than this, are the consequences that occur in many developing countries where the water is unsafe and when mixed with the milk, leads to diarrhoea, dehydration and often death.

As a result of the emergence of such malpractices by baby milk


images or about sending crap messages to your friends sitting across the room, but will this conference be of any use to absolute beginners?

# Ho-ho-ho

## **Our Perfect Society?**

PERFECT SOCIETY is a photographic and CD Rom Aexhibition which explores and questions the criminal justice system and the role it plays within

The artists behind the exhibition, Huw Davies and Arabella Plouriez have drawn on the experience that 2 years working in Durham prison has given them, to give us a

unique insight into prison life. Davies uses photographs to show the life styles of male prisoners, and the way that they express themselves through their tattoos and possessions. Pictures which stuck in my mind included one of an inmate's family against a backdrop of jazz magazines, and a poignant photo taken in the prison yard. The latter teasingly shows the outside

world, in this case a glimpse of Durham Cathedral, to those shut off from it.

Plouriez, on the other hand, works with digitally constructed images of girls' toys, combined with quotes from women prisoners in the high security "H" wing.

These images work well, thanks to the sharp contrast between the innocence of the toys, and the harshness of the words, on to which they are superimposed. A thought provoking view of the prison regime. In the words of one inmate, "Whatever you were like before, you change in here. You have to be tough to survive

Every aspect of life on the inside is there and though at face value, A Perfect Society may appear to be just another art exhibition, it goes a lot deeper than that. For example, the various ways in which photography is used to restrain and identify the criminal is brought into question.

Basically, you get what you want out of this exhibition. I found it fascinating to wander around and get a feel of what life would be like in the slammer.

A Perfect Society runs at the Zone Gallery (83 Westgate Rd) until 3 December.

"THERE is a sense of dread this time of year, like running out of pot and knowing the only way to get high is to drink the bongwater" - Well desperate times call for desperate measures but a little more imagination wouldn't go amiss.

Self-consciously '90s, there are frequent references to various themes of the decade we are only half way through grunge, slackers etc. However it gets a little ridiculous with Hornburg managing to pack the words, millenium, new age and zeitgeist all into one sentence and Jennifer's description of sex as "so eighties'

In 1993 this book would have been a classic, but in 1995 it leaves a stale taste - in Jennifer's terms, its 'so early

# **Porridge Queen**



Vocal sensation Martina talks to Keith Gabriel about pop stardom and life with Tricky.

If I was a disease what would I be? 'Lurve,' I think. Because it's cool."

So says one of the two contrasting talents introduced by the Maxinquaye album; Tricky, the outspoken mumbler of many of the group's lyrics and Martina, she of the lower profile, the affecting, seraphic voice and the utterer of the pening statement. Without Martina's influence, the best album of the year would've been without its unique quality.

It's a recording that she had found hard to enjoy. "It was painful to listen to something that I'd sung with lyrics that meant so much." Now proud of the album, Martina can look back confidently at the songs she helped create, including current single Pumpkin, despite her lack of involvement.

"I was meant to be recording the song but I...er...did a runner when I should've been in the studio. Tricky got pissed off and got Alison (Goldfrapp) in." Could she have done a better job? "Fuck no! I'd have never thought about doing the song with no words. Alison's version is fine."

These recording shenanigans appear to be more evidence of tensions between Martina and Tricky, but this is dismissed. "Nah, Tricky's the only person I want to work with. We're mutable characters.

The solo career of Martina is not in progress yet then, though she has written material already. "I'm not entirely sure of it yet though - I've got to make sure that they're worthy." She is already successful though, regardless of the fact that she doesn't think she qualifies as a top pop

"I don't feel like a pop star at all. I don't get stopped in the street and I still have to change the nappies (of her daughter, Maisey)." Maybe true pop stardom passes her by because of the resistance to pigeonholing herself as a black soul/swingbeat diva or something equally predictable. "It feels good to know that we don't fit in to musical stereotypes I'd feel like a kind of prostitute otherwise."

Martina doesn't even fit in with the music press portrayal of her as elusive and taciturn: "When there's you and Tricky in the same room, what do you expect? He just talks a lot more basically." Martina is friendly, engagingly optimistic and, in her days of living with students, a "king porridge maker." And not many people can say that of themselves.

But while Jarvis' sexy voice is emphatic and emotional, the tunes are versitile yet cold synth pop. Stomper 'Disco 2000' rips off Elton John's 'Saturday Night' and will be an anthem to equal 'Common People'. It's glitter in the gutter, fantasy woven inexpicably into lyrical grim reality.

All this frustration and tension - it's a little disturbing, yet intriguing. Is this the real Mr Cocker or just part of character development. However, with the ultimate combination of sing-a-long melodies and deceptively simple lyrics Pulp are proving to be a different class of pop group.



Although Nestlé is not alone in these malpractices, it violates the code more often than any of its competitors. Whilst the boycott is chiefly targeted at Nescafé, Nestlé's highest profile brand, boycotting their other subsidiaries and brand names will also help to get the message through. You'd be surprised at how many Nestlé products you actually consume: Rowntree, Findus, Shredded Wheat, Perrier, Crosse and Blackwell, Buitoni Carnation, Maggi, Tartex, Chambourcy.

But what have Nestlé to say about the boycott and allegations made against them? When contacted with the details of this

article they responded by saying that Nestlé is in fact "fully comitted to the protection and promotion of breast-feeding" but added that they also believe that infant formula is a "highly nutritious food" especially useful for those women who either cannot or choose not to breast feed. However, they blamed problems with illness in developing countries with the fact that most 'bottle-fed' babies are actually fed with local inadequate milk substitutes such as cereal gruel or diluted animal milk, and that Nestlé could not be held responsible for this.

the allegations that they broke the Code of Marketing of Breast Milk Substitute between 1990-1993. Although they abide fully by the World Health Organisation (WHO) Code, they admit that they are phasing out their donation of free supplies to maternity wards and hospitals in all developing countries. Could such policy reversal be the effect of the boycott to date? Apparently not, as Nestlé also stated that there is no evidence that the boycott has had any effect on their sales, although it might

"unfairly damage our reputation" And finally Nestlé claim that most allegations made against them are untrue. In all countries Nestlé now follow local Government directives about the appropriate language to be used on its packaging.

So the debate continues, and there are many questions left unanswered by Nestlé. Although they claim that a boycott can do little, isn't it better to do little than nothing? The Students' Union participation in the boycott is therefore essential in order to put continuing pressure on Nestlé, but also to scare other companies into changing their marketing techniques so that breast-feeding, whenever possible, is encouraged for the health of children world-



# Felt Better...?

If you're fed up with the cold winter, irritating friends and an even more irritating bank manager, and just wish everyone would fuck off, then Tori Fletcher tells us of someone who will always be willing to listen.

T'S that time of year again isn't it? The anticipation of returning to Newcastle after a long summer break is over. If you're new here and are just focusing on your new surroundings after the Fresher's Week haze, then YOU may be feeling it too. Mid-term blues.




It happens - prabably to more people than you'd ever have realised - but definitely happens. 'Being down', 'feeling miserable', 'depression' or whichever term it chooses to go by, can appear at any time, place or for any reason, however small. It manages to tiptoe up on you just when you've already got your plate piled high, and make you incapable of tackling the smallest task. But one of the worst things about it is its isolation.

"Depression" seems like a scary word connected to mental illness and not being able to cope. It is an unmentionable, a taboo amongst students who are

trying to live up to that carefree, young, 'living to the max' label that is attached to each of us when we cross the student threshold. And if we feel we don't fit in, it seems easier to hide it away from our seemingly happier friends. But this is where you'd be wrong. More than one in seven people suffer from depression and one in four students will at some point have a mental health problem, so you aren't alone. And it's time we started seeing being fed up as a normal part of life. Just like when we get colds or the flu and moan to our friends, so too do we get anxious and uptight and should be able to complain about it in just the same way.

And talking is the answer. You've heard of



them all before: Nightline; The University Counselling Service; Saneline; The Samaritans; The Student Advice Centre or your GP. And as long as there are little things that really piss you off, there will also be these services who will listen.

The pressure to cope with work, relationships, peer or whatever it may be, can build up. A recent study by the Liberal Democrats cited the all-too familiar "intolerable financial pressures" as a major factor in the increase in student suicides by eight times since 1985. It can result in the present seeming meaningless and the future, hopeless. Sleep often becomes the only escape. But however small or large the problem, these

services are here for us all day, all night, every day, every night. And this is the point that Alan Brice of the Student Counselling Service makes. "People may perhaps become solitary and isolated and feel a pain and burden to others but they must find a friend or member of their family or professional whom they can talk to." He stresses that they are used to dealing with people suffering from depression even to the point of suicide. But everyone should "try and get help as it is possible to manage eventually.

So don't let depression drain your motivation and trap you in the empty bubble it creates - TALK!




